On March 7, 2009, the Unity meeting was hosted by the **World Famous Thursday Night Speaker's Group**. This meeting is held at Hope Presbyterian Church at 1698 S. Belcher Rd. It is an Open Speakers Meeting and begins at 7:30 p.m.

The chairperson was Don S and How It Works was read by Tom H.

The first speaker was Jimmy K. He said that Adele stole his joke so he would not be able to tell one. He is grateful for AA and they are his kind of people. He did not feel that way when he got here. He had been on a crash course for oblivion and the State Penn Police saved his life. He thought that his life was over but he was wrong, his life has taken off, expanded inside and out. He was afraid of AA people but he joined the program in 1987, he surrendered, stayed and is happy to be here. He is involved in service work and has a full life. He was at the Pinellas County Jail last week and he watched a Dean Martin tape with the convicts. He would rather do that than talk in front of us. Jim feels that it is most important to express gratitude to his group and AA.

Tom B was the second speaker and he is grateful to be grateful. He joined AA 14 years ago in Boston. He has the Rite of Passage, coming from a dysfunctional family where everyone was screwed up. They had many wild experiences with alcohol etc. He stole a chicken and stuffed it down a friends pants and the friend was arrested but he did not tell the cops who did it. The cop asked "Do you mean to tell me that you let strangers put chicken down your ass". Tom took a guy to Detox and he got sober but Tom could not stop drinking. His friend offered help but he did not want it. He was asked, "can you go a day without a drink?". He went to his first AA meeting but did nothing right. Well, he did join a group and got a sponsor but his self-centered fear ate him up. People kept telling him that he was right where he was supposed to be and that scared him. Eventually he opened up and the fellowship bloomed in him. God works through people. He was able to walk his three daughters down the aisle when they were married. It has been an incredible journey.

The third speaker was Annie K. Her Home Group is the greatest and they are her kind of people. They are honest with each other and like each other. She began drinking when she was in her twenties. She was looking to escape whatever and however it would take. When she drank the pain went away especially the emotional pain. She picked some really sick men and has two kids. Her last drunk was 9/13/78. She ran out of excuses or options. She said that excuses are like tails, everyone's got one. She was insane and the 24 hour hotline saved her. If she had not joined AA, she would not have the honor or the privilege of meeting AA people. Today, she

is a caregiver and has healthy relationships. She has been married for 19 years to Jimmy. Annie has learned how to receive love and God has a place for her in AA.

Peter B. was the last speaker. He became sober on April Fool's day. 4/1/04. He started drinking as a teenager and drank to escape and seek oblivion. He grew up in an alcoholic home with lots of isms. It was the only way that he knew how to live. His disease took him many places, destroyed many relationships and lost many jobs. He never thought that it was alcohol but he drank until nothing worked anymore. After he hit bottom, he found AA, God, forgiveness, patience, how not to react and gratitude. He is truly blessed and a grateful alcoholic.

The chips were handed out by Charlie M.

The March 14th meeting was hosted by the Off Your Chest Group which is held at the 1250 Room situated at 1250 Seminole Blvd Unit #3 at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday. This is a men's meeting with no smoking during the meeting. They have a Big Book, Step and Tradition throughout the month.

The meeting was chaired by Ricky B. The preamble was read by Roger R. and How It Works was read by Jack L.

The first speaker was Jay S. His sobriety date is January 5, 2005. He was 16 when he came to his 1st meeting and saw all the old people and could not identify with them. The seed was planted but he continued to party and his life became worse. He still hung around the Log Cabin and one day Carl said that he loved him. A sponsor was picked for him and tried to call him at least 2 times a week. This man is no longer his sponsor, he is his friend and business partner. He has another sponsor and got into the steps right away, listened and tried to relate. Life is great to-day and tries to keep busy, He has taken up sky-diving. He takes meetings to treatment centers and will keep on doing what he has been doing.

The next speaker was Shawn W. He was 16 when he first came to AA but he couldn't get it. There were too many old people and he couldn't relate to them. He was in and out of the program for 20 years. He saw many of his friends either in jail or dead from alcoholism. He became willing and got a sponsor who helped him work the steps. He loves the fellowship and is leading a sober, useful life to-day. He stays involved and tries to give back the gift of sobriety. He has been sober for 12 years and believes that today Alcoholics get beat up quicker, things have changed and people have changed. John is grateful and keeps his spirituality close. He advises new people to work to stay sober and become useful and whole one day at a time.

Roger S. was the third speaker. His sobriety date is 9/14/97. He has a sponsor and sponsors others. Because of his drinking, he lost self respect and the will

to live. He always looked for an easier softer way and instead got into a lot of trouble. However, he finally arrived in AA and he got a sponsor, began the steps became serious about the program. He went to a retreat and had a spiritual experience. His obsession was lifted and he has not drunk since. He jumped into AA and stayed in the center of the boat. The fellowship has become his life with many friends and many service jobs. He would not change his life for anything, it is an awesome way to live.

The final speaker was Scottie Joe R. He was the youngest of 10 children and all his family members drank. His Dad died when he was 10 and he was spoiled his whole life. He was the neighborhood paper boy and he had a lot of friends who grew up together. He began drinking at 18 and he had a great life. He had girlfriends, good jobs and nice girl. He got married at 23 and she came from the other side of town and did not drink. He was miserable and tried not to drink. He came to America in 1971 with 2 kids and even though he was well off and had a nice house, he was miserable because he could not drink. His wife asked him to leave in 1978 and he went to a rooming house. After 3 weeks, he was in tough shape and went to an AA meeting in July 1978. After his wife divorced him, he made a life for himself and began a new career. He never imagined that he could come this far in 30 years and will never give it up.

Dave D. presented the chips.

The Sunshine City Group hosted the March 21st meeting. This meeting is held at Pasadena Presbyterian Church situated 100 Pasadena Ave North. Meetings are on Tuesday night at 7 p.m.. It is Open Discussion for 3 weeks and Open Speaker on the last week.

Carol V chaired the meeting. Carol is an exceptional lady. The Preamble was read by Kevin B. and How It Works was read by Sharon F.

Joan D. was the first speaker. She learned about drinking from her parents who had lots of parties and when they moved to Florida, their neighborhood partied a great deal. She was a super mom. She sewed, cooked and was on the school board. Her drinking progressed to daily bouts. She came into AA and struggled. She did not have a sponsor and did not go to many meetings. She began a Step Study program and began to end her misery. Joan took us through the Steps and was very inspiring and helpful to everyone. In Step one she admitted that she was powerless, however she had a hard time admitting that her life was unmanageable and in Step Two, she believed in a power greater than herself but she began to realize that her thinking was insane. Step Three is where she made a decision to turn her life over to God. For Step Four, she wrote her story and discussed it with her Sponsor. She has found that her life is easier after working the Steps. She got rid of

her resentments and made her living amends. She has made amends to her children by changing her behavior and she has a great relationship with them to-day. AA has given her peace of mind and she has fun. It helps that she is aware of her shortcomings and has done a lot of praying about it. She is involved in service works, has sponsees and is secretary of her group. There is always something that a member can do.

The second speaker was Bill B. who is 85 years old. He breaks his life into 3 parts. The first 33 years, he spent in another country where he learned to become a survivor and he was convinced that he could handle any problem. The second 33 years, he spent in USA and becoming an alcoholic. He struggled for years to get sober but he couldn't convince himself that he was an alcoholic. He had a difficult time because of the language and the culture. He could not find a Higher Power nor did he understand what it was about. He found a sponsor and went to a lot of meetings. He began to listen but did not have his heart in it. He began to listen carefully to a quiet, peaceful man and asked him for help in finding a God. The man told him that he just needed to find a God of his understanding and he was not alone anymore. He began to understand the meaning of the steps and how to use them. He has a best friend (Bob) with whom he can discuss life's problems and he can trust him. He lived in Communism for 33 years and has found freedom in USA but AA gave him a freedom that he never dreamed about. His sobriety date is April 1, 1989 so he will be celebrating 20 years of sobriety in April. Now, he never has to hide, never has to fear and no more guilt. The white chip is invaluable and helps an alcoholic to earn his/her freedom.

Mar 28th was Unity's Anniversary meeting was hosted by The Hopeful Group and we were treated to delicious Coconut cake and a Lemon cake. This group meets on Friday nite at 8 p.m. at Back Porch on Starkey Rd. were the Hosts. It is a Speaker meeting and I understand that it is a great meeting.

Andy K. was the chairman and Shawn M read the Preamble along with Dave H. reading How It Works.

The first speaker was Susan S. who loves being sober and is very grateful for her sobriety. Her sobriety date is April 21, 1976 and she thought everything would be better and it eventually did get better. She grew up in an alcoholic home and she began drinking in high school. She felt like she was in heaven when she had alcohol in her system. She struggled for several years, got married, had two kids but she couldn't stay sober. She went to AA and asked lots of questions, got phone numbers and felt like she belonged and she got hope. She is still here and her life is second to none and it has turned around. She has a great husband and they have a lot of fun together. She prays to God (thy will not mine be done).

Johnny Buc was the second speaker. His sobriety date is July 18, 1984 and he learned to listen and identify and not compare. He was a pain as a kid and did not get along with his father so he was sent to live with his sister in California. He had a lot of fun out there, graduated from High School but did not attend the Graduation. He continued drinking and caused a lot of problems in his family. He got married and started his own business which was successful. He wanted to get sober and but he did not know how. Eventually he found his way to AA. He has five children and has more good times in Sobriety than he did drinking. His advice is don't drink, show up, listen to the old-timers, talk to people and give AA a chance. Have fun!

Speaker #3 was Dick S. His father and grandfather died from alcoholism. As a result he grew up terrified and hid from his father. The holidays were marred by parties and visits from the police. He began drinking and eventually it was not fun anymore, becoming suicidal and he hated life. At a men's club, he heard about AA and imagined that it was a horrible place. He came to the program and realized that he is powerless over alcohol and lives a terrific life one day at a time.

Norm C. was the next speaker and said that he did not drink until he joined the service where he learned to drink. He met a girl and got married and they had 6 kids. She was a good wife but could not handle money and eventually they got divorced which was a blessing in disguise. She gave him two of the girls and that was the best thing that ever happened to him. He kept drinking and got into many scrapes until he realized that he was scaring his daughters. He asked God for help and a week later his employer was forced to send him to AA. In AA, he identified and did not compare. He stayed sober and got back many material things. He got involved in service work and stayed involved in AA. God put Bonnie in his life and they have been together for 28 years. He has been sober for 32 years and is proud of it.

Rick S. was the last speaker and is happy to be sober. He grew up in an alcoholic home in Boston. There were lots of wild parties. He found alcohol in Junior High School and slipped into Denial. He lost his spirituality and thought that God had abandoned him. He lost his values and his life slid downwards. He joined the service but he was in trouble. He went to an AA meeting on the base and found that it was comfortable for him but he did not think that he was an alcoholic. Eventually he joined a group and got a sponsor.

(What goes around....)

Imagine this; I was driving to an A.A. meeting just the other day when a thought entered my mind. Yes I know about first thoughts, the "next right thing" and all that good A.A. folklore dedicated to the very negative notion that as an ex drunk I'm pretty much always wrong. However, as I was saying before I was so rudely interrupted, I was driving to an AA meeting when the phrase, "what goes around comes around" came to mind.

Now here's the rub; generally in the past this notion always carried a negative interpretation. "Oh he'll/she'll get what he/she deserves!" "G-d will punish him/her.", etc. Never in my wildest rants and raves often fear and ego driven and requiring from this G-d of my misunderstanding righteous retribution

against those whose behavior offended me, did I ever consider the positive aspects of this interesting phrase: "what goes around...."

Lately, and if this offends the die hard Pharisees of AA, so be it I have been attending a spiritually focused meeting based on some "NON Conference Approved" literature of which both Bill and Bob, remember them, our Co-founders availed themselves prior to there even being AA and upon which all AA literature is based! As a result of attending this spiritual meeting on a regular basis and applying these very same principles which undergird AA, I have come to a "turning point" in my emotional sobriety. One of the several promises, you all (not yawl, the boat) know the one; "Our whole attitude and outlook upon life will change," has taken on a powerful and operative new meaning in my life. By focusing on the positive aspects of recovery rather than just the negatives, there's more to my life today than just cleaning up the "wreckage of the past." Now I can enjoy the concept of "what goes around..." in a new light. By making my self more available to other people, to see them with less judgment on my part has in deed often, but not fully(progress not perfection) liberated me from the fear and ego driven need to see others punished for my misunderstanding of the very principles I so loudly proclaim.

It is so much easier and so much less exhausting to detach from how others in my mind are confusing "talking the talk" as opposed to "walking the walk." At this juncture I must of course disabuse both you and me of the quaint notion that I have miraculously been cured of either my alcoholism (not alcoholwas'm) or my defects of character. What has happened, I guess is that the promises against my will and over my objections are beginning to infiltrate my life. Still. I must be ever vigilant against the lurking notion that I can reward my newly admitted progress with the insidious idea of the first drink!
